Enjoying the great outdoors (allergies and all)

Most kids will agree: The sniffling, sneezing and watery eyes of allergy season don't add up to a fun day outdoors. And seasonal allergies paired with asthma can be downright dangerous. Allergies can disrupt sleep, causing irritability; reduce the ability to concentrate; and lower quality of life in general. But with some preparation, your child can still enjoy playing outside while keeping symptoms under control.

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See an allergist

Knowing what you're dealing with can help you avoid or treat the problem more effectively. If your child had allergies last year, it's likely they'll be back this year. Your pediatrician may suggest visiting an allergist to pinpoint exactly what the triggers are.

The silver lining: Seasonal allergies are predictable. For instance, if tree pollen is the culprit, you can keep your child from spending long periods outdoors in the spring when tree pollen is at its peak. Taking preventive allergy medications is also a good way to lessen symptoms.



Consider hot, dry, windy weather conditions a red flag. The wind picks up pollen, and the dry conditions make it easier for pollen to travel through the air. When all that pollen hits your kid's eyes, nose and lungs, it triggers itchy eyes, a runny nose and difficulty breathing.



Check the weather report in the morning for pollen and mold counts. Pay attention to the numbers — when the counts are high, set a limit on time spent outside.


Watch out for caterpillars

Kids love bugs, and fuzzy caterpillars are especially cute. However, in some people, the spongy moth (formerly the gypsy moth) caterpillar can cause unpleasant side effects. Its hairs contain histamine, a chemical that can cause an allergic skin reaction, like itchiness or a rash. Sometimes the rash is mistaken for poison ivy. Do some research with your child to find out which caterpillars are best admired from a distance.

Keep allergens outside

During the worst of allergy season, staying indoors can protect your kids when you take the right precautions. Close windows and use your air conditioner to keep your house and car pollen-free.

And when kids do go outside, have them change clothes and wash hands to banish pollen hitchhikers when they come in. A shower before bed can keep pollen in their hair from making its way to their pillow and causing symptoms



Public health emergency ending: What does this mean for you?

On Jan. 30, the Biden administration announced that the federal public health emergency (PHE) is ending on Thursday, May 11. During the services (such as testing, vaccines, treatments and telehealth services) was waived. After the PHE ends, Geisinger Health Plan will continue



Good health is rewarding

Earn a variety of rewards just for keeping your child up to date on routine vaccines, dental visits and health screenings. It's easy. Once your child completes each health activity, you'll earn a gift card. You don't need to do anything else.

- Immunizations for adolescents –
 \$25 Walmart gift card*. Members are eligible once they complete all adolescent vaccinations:
- One meningococcal vaccine between ages 11 and 13
- o One Tdap vaccine between ages 10 and 13
- o Two HPV vaccines between ages 9 and 13
- Annual dental visit \$25 Walmart gift card. Just complete one dental checkup with a licensed dental provider during the calendar year.
- Lead screening for infants and toddlers –
 \$10 Walmart gift card. Members who are at least
 9 months of age are eligible if they have at least
 one blood test to check for lead poisoning
 by their second birthday.

*Walmart gift cards are only good for the purchase of clothing and groceries, including baby food and formula.

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GHP Kids CHIP coverage expands statewide

Pennsylvania's Children's Health Insurance Program (CHIP), brought to you by Geisinger Health Plan Kids (GHP Kids), expanded to statewide coverage in February.

"Every child should have access to affordable healthcare," said Kurt Wrobel, president of Geisinger Health Plan. "Expanding our services throughout Pennsylvania will give kids access to GHP Kids so they have access to quality care that is affordable for their family."

GHP Kids serves more than 10,000 members and is available for all uninsured kids and teenagers up to age 19. Many services are covered, including routine doctor visits; preventive services; dental, vision and hearing exams; emergency care; and hospital care, as well as prescriptions.

Keep an eye on your prescription glasses purchase

- Check the company's online reviews. Be especially wary of buying from an online retailer since you can't see and touch what you're purchasing.
- Ask your neighbors, family and friends for recommendations. Ask the cost of their glasses purchase for an idea of what the office charges.
- Know what you want to pay before you go. Decide what your budget is before your purchase. Bring a friend or family member with you to help you stick to your budget.
- Don't get hung up on designer frames. Many attractive styles cost less because you're not paying for a brand name.

If you're ready for new specs, do your homework first. Stick to your budget and don't be afraid to leave without buying anything.
