Aeromedical/Critical Care Ground Transfer (Life Flight)/Scholastic Shifts

Aeromedical/Critical Care Ground Transfer (Life Flight)/Scholastic Shifts will occur longitudinally over the course of PGY-1 through PGY-3. The longitudinal design and time requirement of these shifts is intended to provide adequate protected time for each resident to fulfill scholarly expectations as well as provide experience in pre-hospital patient care.

This experience consists of approximately thirty (30) twelve-hour shifts throughout their residency training: PGY-1 (12 shifts); PGY 2 (8 shifts); PGY-3 (10 shifts). In-person attendance for these shifts is required just as attendance is required for a clinical shift.

Community EM Shifts

Community emergency medicine shifts will occur longitudinally over the course of PGY-2 and PGY-3 training levels. Resident will complete 1-2, 9 hour shifts per assigned EM block. The staffing structure in our community affiliates allows for close 1:1 supervision without competition from other learners. In addition, since the majority of our graduates practice in similar settings, the learners are developing competence in skills not available at our main training site, i.e. resource limited resuscitation, decision to transfer. Patient populations also differ between the sites, allowing the learners to care for a more diverse population of patients.

EMS/EM/Jepoardy Rotation

Advanced EMS - Residents will have an advanced experience in the medical oversight and clinical practice of Emergency Medical Services (EMS), including exposure to out-of-hospital patient care through ground EMS, mobile integrated healthcare (MIH) and air ambulance service. Residents will have the opportunity to participate in EMS medical direction activities with various agencies that receive medical direction services from our Division of EMS, including LifeFlight, Danville Ambulance, Geisinger's Mobile Integrated Healthcare service, and other affiliated EMS agencies. Residents will have the opportunity to participate in the education of all levels of EMS providers. They will participate in the quality improvement review of care delivered by EMS agencies, and residents will attend related administrative sessions related to EMS system structure and medical oversight. Residents will have the opportunity to participate in patient care in the field on EMS and MIH calls. Residents will cover up to 12 Emergemcy Department shifts during the rotation block.

TICU/Trauma Rotation

PGY3 residents will assist the Overnight Trauma Surgery service. PGY3s will be responsible for responding to all trauma alerts and responsible for care of the Trauma ICU patients on the overnight shift. They will work to stabilize and resuscitate the acutely decompensating patient and perform necessary therapeutic interventions. They will assist by ordering appropriate diagnostic testing and therapies and help the Trauma team with the admitting process and indicated procedures after trauma alerts. They may also be called upon to assist with Emergency Department consults and procedures with the Trauma night coverage attending.
