Addressing Communities' Needs: The Opioid Epidemic

The opioid epidemic was the focus of the 2016 Fall Keystone Symposium. More than 100 healthcare professionals gathered for lectures and a panel discussion with community leaders who battle the opioid crisis every day. The Lackawanna-Susquehanna Office for Drug and Alcohol Programs partnered with TCMC to raise awareness on how prescription pain-killer misuse is leading to a heroin epidemic in our region and throughout the United States.

Margaret Jarvis, M.D., medical director of Marworth Treatment Center, served as keynote speaker addressing *Quality Healthcare for the Opiate Addicted Patient*, followed by John Boll, D.O., Susquehanna Health, addressing *Best Practices in Pain Management* and Kathleen Hugo sharing her story of recovery from opioid addiction. The symposium concluded with a panel discussion with representatives from law enforcement, addiction services, pharmacy and the legal system.

With deaths from prescription medication and heroin reaching epidemic proportions in the U.S. and northeast and central Pennsylvania, recognizing the signs and symptoms of abuse, knowing where to refer addicted patients and understanding current prescribing practices is critical to saving lives and halting this epidemic.

Protecting Our Children: A Medical/Legal Event

Protecting Our Children, a medical/legal partnership, featured experts on child trafficking, pedophilia and victims turned perpetrators. Partners included the Lackawanna and Luzerne County Medical Societies, the Lackawanna and Luzerne Bar Associations and the Children's Advocacy Center/NEPA. Continuing education credits were given for healthcare providers and lawyers.

Speakers and panelists on child sexual abuse topics included Christiana Dominguez and Jamie Chubb, from VAST, (The Valley Against

Sex Trafficking), a coalition of professionals and community members dedicated to eliminating human sex trafficking in the Lehigh Valley. From law enforcement, speakers included Michelle Olshefski, assistant US attorney and Justin Leri, PA Office of Attorney General; Jenny Roberts, assistant district attorney, Luzerne County and Robert Klein, district attorney, Susquehanna County. Representatives from social work agencies representing abused children included: Dominick DiSalvo, Kidspeace; Janine Fortney, LSW, Children's Center of Susquehanna and Wyoming Counties; Michael Novinger, M.D., and Michael Rogan, M.D., Children's Advocacy Center and Tara Williams, Office of Youth and Family Services, Lackawanna County.

VAST reports that human trafficking is the fastest growing criminal activity in the world and sexual assault will affect approximately one in six boys and one in four girls before the age of 18, according to the Centers for Disease Control.

Special Thanks to Our Volunteer Clinical Faculty

One of my favorite quotes by the inspirational writer William Arthur Ward reads:

"The mediocre teacher tells. The good teacher explains. The superior teacher demonstrates. The great teacher inspires."

No comment could better exemplify the role of our volunteer clinical faculty here at The Commonwealth Medical College. Back in 2004, when the medical college was in its planning stage, it became clear to our founders that our existence would depend on the dedication of volunteer physicians and healthcare institutions that would serve as mentors to our students. An early survey, conducted across the three campuses, of nearly 1,000 healthcare professionals, revealed that these professionals were not motivated by financial gain, faculty appointment or



professional edge. Overwhelmingly, the survey showed they would volunteer because it was the right thing to do and it provided an opportunity to give back to the healing profession as so many professionals had mentored them in their formative years as physicians.

Going back to the time of Hippocrates, medicine has always promoted mentoring as the primary method of teaching aspiring physicians. This enabled the transfer of the art and actual practice of healing based on science. Mentoring is different because it is not just teaching, but the application of scientific findings at the bedside. Our volunteer clinical faculty, with the assistance of the various healthcare delivery hospitals and agencies, bring this art and science to TCMC students.

Through the committed and relentless efforts of the regional teams on every campus, we have been able to match students with volunteer clinical faculty throughout their four years of education. Today, volunteer clinical faculty number more than 1,000 men and women who dedicate their time to mentor students on their journeys to becoming physicians. Our attrition rate is less than five percent and our satisfaction rate continues to be above 90 percent in our seventh year.

Thank you to each and every one of you for making our dream of a successful, accredited medical school a reality. There are too many mentors to mention in one article, but without you, we cannot succeed. You are leading committees for admisions, and curriculum development, providing classroom lectures, troubleshooting schedules in hospitals and clinics, assisting with LCME accreditation, writing letters of recommendation and presenting lectures at our Keystone Symposia, to name just a few of your countless contributions. You make our mission possible and you have truly inspired the next generation of physicians, healers, teachers and mentors.

In March, the TCMC class of 2016 participated in the residency match, hosted by the National Resident Matching Program. They competed with 42,370 applicants for 30,750 open residency spaces across the nation. TCMC students successfully matched into competitive residency programs: 37 in primary care and all others in a variety of competitive specialties. On a proud note, 26 students matched into a Pennsylvania-based program.
