TCMC Launches Commitment to Change Program

Commitment To Change

Commitment to Change is an educational concept that enhances the effectiveness of a CME activity. Studies show that physicians who make a "commitment to change" their practice behavior as the result of an educational activity are more likely to make changes than those who do not. The CME world today expects that programs will result in a learning to change continuum. The TCMC Office of CME has adopted the concept to better measure the

effectiveness of our educational programs. We will be asking physicians to indicate changes they expect to make on a commitment to change form after selected CME activities. Changes may be of an educational or clinical nature, depending on the content of the CME activity. We will follow up with responders to determine if changes were able to be incorporated or if any barriers exist to implementing positive change.

Class of 2014 Excels with Step I Exam Results

TCMC has learned the results of the United States Medical Licensing Examination (USMLE) and we are pleased to report that the class of 2014 did extremely well. TCMC third-year students had a mean score of 231 on Step I of the USMLE, with 98% of the class passing. Both of these measures exceeded the performance of students nationally. This is the second consecutive year in which TCMC students have performed exceedingly well. "I am sure that everyone in the TCMC community is gratified by these results and shares my pride in our students. These scores reflect their hard work and the success of our curriculum," said Steven J. Scheinman, MD, President and Dean.

Step I of the USMLE determines whether medical students can apply important concepts of the basic sciences to the practice of medicine and can demonstrate a foundation for the safe and competent practice of medicine. Nationally, through October 3, 2012, 96% of all US/Canadian first-time test takers passed the exam and the preliminary national mean is 227. "I applaud our faculty and staff whose dedication and efforts have continued to give our students a platform for sustained success. And of course I applaud our students for their excellent performance. Congratulations to everyone!," added Dean Scheinman.

ACE Physician Recognition Program Underway

The Academy of Clinical Educators, or ACE program, was launched at the Regional Clinical Faculty Meetings this past October. Physicians were inducted into the program based on appointment and active participation with the designation of "Member" and received a framed certificate at the meeting honoring their dedication to the students and TCMC.

An application review process for advancement in the program will take place annually beginning in the spring of 2013, followed by a recognition event. We are already receiving applications. The deadline for advancement applications is January 31st. TCMC to Host Obesity Symposium April 6th

The Obesity Epidemic - Prevention & Management

Obesity, considered a chronic disease by the World Health Organization, has reached nearly epidemic proportions both in the United States and globally. According to CDC data, Pennsylvania ranks 20th in obesity rate of all states with 28.6% of the state population obese.

Health care providers have an important role in identifying, preventing, and managing the disease. Despite recommendation and screening guidelines, studies have shown that physicians and other health care professionals are often unprepared to manage the important problem of obesity and its clinical implications. The health care team must be able to consistently monitor weight in their patients as part of routine clinical practice, integrate lifestyle interventions into overweight and obesity management plans, and appraise new and emerging pharmacologic and surgical therapies for the treatment of obesity. Because of the huge increase in complications from obesity, education targeted to physicians and other health care professionals aimed at reducing obesity could improve outcomes in a significant number of patients. This symposium is designed to provide physicians and other health care professionals with information on the prevention of childhood and adult obesity and behavioral, pharmacological and surgical approaches to treating obesity.

Objectives:

As a result of attending this symposium, health professionals will be able to:

- Explain how to assess obesity in the clinical setting and recognize risk factors for obesity related complications.
- Discuss strategies that could be used in a clinical setting to prevent obesity in children and adults.
- Describe various treatment options for obesity including surgical, pharmacological and behavioral.

Registration:

Online registration will be available after January 23rd, 2013 at www.tcmedc.org. Printed brochures and registration material will be mailed in early February.

Fee: The fee for the symposium is \$30.00 for TCMC affiliated faculty and staff, \$45.00 for all others. Fee includes a certificate for approved credits (see below) which will be issued within one week after the event. A continental breakfast and break will be included.

Credit Approvals:

TCMC is accredited by the Accreditation Council for Continuing Medical Education to provide continuing medical education for physicians. TCMC designates this live activity for a maximum of 4.0 AMA PRA Category 1 Credit(s)TM. Physicians should claim only the credit commensurate with the extent of their participation in the activity.

The Nesbitt School of Pharmacy at Wilkes University is accredited by the Accreditation Council for Pharmacy Education as a provider of continuing pharmacy education. Participants who attend the full program and complete an evaluation form will be awarded a statement of credit at the conclusion of the program for .40 CEUs (4 hours). ACPE # 0097-999-12-057-L01-P.

Wilkes University is an approved provider of continuing nursing education by the PA State Nurses Association, an accredited approver by the American Nurses Credentialing Center's Commission on Accreditation. Nurses who attend will receive a certificate for 4 hours at the conclusion of the program. This program is approved for four (4) continuing education hours for social workers applicable toward NJ/PA/LSW licensure renewal.

Marywood University is recognized by the National Board of Certified Counselors to offer continuing education for National Certified Counselors. They adhere to NBCC continuing education guidelines. This program is approved for four (4) ACT 48 professional development hours for Pennsylvania educators.

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Update on Interprofessional Education and the NECPA-IPEC

There continues to be a lot of excitement around Interprofessional Education (IPE). I've been busy working on the MD4 selective IPE rotations. Each TCMC student is required to complete a two week rotation in a healthcare setting that utilizes a highfunctioning interprofessional team. This IPE selective can occur in a number of different settings allowing students to foster individual interests. I am working on the syllabus for the rotation and cultivating sites for the medical students. If you know of practice settings which function in a team-based setting, feel free to contact me.

The original impetus for the Northeast/Central Pennsylvania Interprofessional Education Coalition (NECPA-IPEC) came from TCMC. The NECPA-IPEC consists of 11 independent colleges and universities throughout Lackawanna, Luzerne, and Lycoming counties and the NEPA Area Health Education Center (AHEC). In addition to its regional, non-centralized model, the NECPA-IPEC is also unique in that it is inclusive of many more professions.

The NECPA-IPEC is busy with a number of initiatives. For example, four of us from TCMC (Maurice Clifton, Ginny Clarke, Diane Haleem and myself) visited the University of Washington in Seattle for a Visiting Scholars program on December 17th and 18th, 2012. In addition, the NECPA-IPEC is about to launch its own web site!

The fourth annual NECPA-IPEC Collaborative Care Summit will be held on March 20th, 2013, from 4-7:30 PM at multiple sites simultaneously. We are pleased to announce that the first of TCMC's fourth-year students have successfully matched into residency programs as part of the military match program for students in US military medical careers. Trevor Echelmeier has matched in Radiology at Madigan Army Medical Center and Scott Dalane matched in Radiology at Walter Reed National Military Center. For both students, these programs were their first choice.

While most graduating seniors from US Medical Schools participate in the National Resident Matching Program (NRMP) and learn of the locations of their residencies at noon on Friday, March 15th, military programs have a separate process in December. In addition, Ophthalmology, Plastic Surgery, and Urology use processes that are earlier than the NRMP.

The rest of TCMC's medical students have been interviewing across the country in a wide range of specialties and programs and join nearly 16,000 fourth-year medical students and 20,000 independent students to compete for 26,000 open residency spaces across the nation. TCMC Students Lend a Hand Post Hurricane Sandy in New York

Robert Gessman, TCMC MD Class of 2013, witnessed the destruction caused by hurricanes Ike and Gustav in 2008. On November 17th, 2012, Rob and 30 TCMC students headed to Staten Island, NY, to respond to Superstorm Sandy's destruction of his hometown. An emergency medical technician before enrolling in medical college, Rob was in Los Angeles interviewing for a residency program when the storm hit. For several days, he could not get in touch with his family. "It's scary not knowing the condition of your family, your home," he said. "It felt like I was a world away."

When he headed home, Rob found that his parents' home was without power, but was spared the damage seen at the shore. He visited shelters, asking first responders and those whose homes were hit hardest what they needed. "It's so important for me to give back," said Rob. When he returned to Scranton, he organized a collection drive at TCMC and solicited donations. Rob was impressed with the willingness of his classmates to give up a weekend, when they could have been studying, for a cause that means so much to him. "It's an exciting and inspiring cause to work for," he said.
