Pennsylvania's Child Protective Services Law requires all physicians and other healthcare professionals to attend child abuse recognition and reporting training for professional licensure or relicensure beginning this year.

are encouraged to attend. ACT 31 also requires nursing home administrations, funeral directors, social work-

home administrations, funeral directors, social workers, marriage & family counselors, professional counselors, psychologists and all therapists, including physical, occupational, speech, language & hearing, and massage, to complete an approved session.

"Child abuse is a heartbreaking form of violence that plagues the most innocent and vulnerable members of our community. TCMC is proud to be working with our partners to provide this program that will surely be valuable to a wide range of professionals and community members who deal courageously with this problem daily," said Dr. Scheinman.

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Keynote: Ann S. Botash, MD

Ann S. Botash, MD is a nationally recognized expert in child abuse pediatrics. She serves as a Professor of Pediatrics and Vice Chair for Education at Upstate Golisano Children's Hospital and is Co-Director and Founder of the Child Abuse Referral and Evaluation Program. She is one of the founders of the Onondaga County McMahon/Ryan Child Advocacy Center, and currently co-directs the Upstate Golisano Children's Hospital Child Abuse Referral and Evaluation (CARE) Program in Syracuse New York. She was an inaugural member of the Ray E. Helfer Society, an international society of child abuse physicians, and is past-President of that organization.



Ann S. Botash, MD Keynote Speaker

In the field of education, Dr. Botash has served as residency program co-director and as clerkship director for the pediatric department. She has led statewide education for healthcare professionals in child abuse identification and management through grant funding of over 3 million dollars. She regularly holds webinars, offers online CME and MOC coursework and downloadable resources, and manages two searchable websites. These two websites have been steadily accessed by over 2 million visitors throughout the world.

She has over 40 publications and has provided hundreds of lectures, workshops and seminars. She has written a primer for medical providers, Evaluating Child Sexual Abuse: Education Manual for Medical Professionals, which is the first step in the training to become a CHAMP Provider.

"There is No Excuse for Child Abuse"

April is Child Abuse Prevention Month. To educate the community on the prevalence of child abuse, the Children's Advocacy Center/NEPA plants one pinwheel to represent each child victim served at the child abuse intervention center. This year the Children's Advocacy Center will plant 1,448 pinwheels on the lawn of the Lackawanna County Courthouse. Executive Director, Mary Ann LaPorta, reports that since opening its' doors in 1998, the CAC has served over 11,000 child & teen victims of suspected abuse & neglect.
